DURANGO, CO -- In response to the Senate Energy and Natural Resources <u>Public Lands, Forests & Mining</u> <u>Subcommittee Legislative Hearing</u> today, <u>The Mountain Pact</u>, an organization that works with local elected officials in over 80 communities across the Western U.S., released the following statements:

Flagstaff City Council Member Jim McCarthy said, "The Grand Canyon is one of the seven natural wonders of the world. As a local elected official, and lover of the Canyon, I am glad the Senate Energy and Natural Resources sub-committee has finally taken up the <u>Grand Canyon Protection Act</u>, a bill that would permanently ban mining around this treasured National Park. I, and over <u>two-thirds of Arizona voters</u>, support making the ban on new mining near the Grand Canyon permanent."

Anna Peterson, Executive Director of <u>The Mountain Pact said</u>, "We are eager for many of the bills from the <u>Grand Canyon Protection Act</u>, to the <u>Berryessa Snow Mountain National Monument Expansion Act</u>, as well as many of the bills in today's Senate ENR subcommittee's hearing, to move quickly to a full committee vote and pass quickly in the Senate. Passage of these bills are important to western communities as protecting public lands has always been a bi-partisan effort and one that all Americans can celebrate."
