The Mountain Pact Thanks the Biden Administration for Holding a Public Meeting on the Potential Baaj Nwaavjo l'tah Kukveni Grand Canyon National Monument

DURANGO, CO - In response to the Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service hosting a public listening session on the Tribally-Led proposed *Baaj Nwaavjo I'tah Kukveni Grand Canyon National Monument*, The Mountain Pact, an organization that works with local elected officials in nearly 100 communities across the Western U.S., released the below statement:

"We thank the BLM and Forest Service for coming to Arizona to hold a public listening session to learn more about the Tribal push for President Biden to designate Baaj Nwaavjo I'tah Kukveni Grand Canyon National Monument.
